concerns, dedicated restrooms for the Pre-school and main building restrooms that are always accessible even when school is in session.

The Pre-school calendar is, for the most part, dictating the schedule with the goal to complete all work during the summer break. Once construction begins on May 26th, some areas of the church will not be accessible until the work is complete on August 4th. We realize that this will be an adjustment for all of us and we ask for your patience. In general, during the time of construction, there will be no access to the Library, the Pre-School classrooms or office, the children's playground and the Men's or Women's restrooms in that building. From time to time, parts of the side walk between the church office and the playground will be closed as well. Again, we ask for your patience. There may be times when you can't see the reason for an area to be temporarily closed, but once the construction begins, those areas must be available to the contractor so that the work is not delayed but more importantly, for the ongoing safety and protection of all involved.

Please continue to watch the Window, Monitor and bulletin announcements for updates and the other ways this process will be managed as it progresses.

"About Being Presbyterian"

It has been estimated that 6 out of every 10 members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) did not grow up in the denomination. I believe that may be very true of us at Northwood, if not more so. This being the case, I am making available a series of articles about "being Presbyterian." These articles will mostly be a reminder to many of you, but there may be something new here as well.

What do Presbyterians believe about the Bible? With limited space, here it goes!

I think Presbyterians believe that through the Bible, God speaks and reveals Himself to us--that the Bible is inspired by God. For some, this means the Bible is inerrant or infallible. For others, it means even though the Bible is culturally conditioned, it breathes with the life of God and we hear God's voice speaking to us through it. Believe it or not, in any church, people hold to many different views about the Bible.

What is true is this: the inspired writers of Scripture grasped something of God's grand revelation of Himself that we continually need to learn from and discuss. For above all we believe as Presbyterians in the Authority of the Bible to guide us in all matters of life and faith.

Presbyterians have always stressed the importance of scholarship and study of the Bible. (I encourage you to become involved in Adult Education at Northwood if you are not already doing so). All the way back to the reformer John Calvin, it has been crucial that our decisions as a church do not rest on the understanding of Biblical novices whose knowledge of Scripture is only surface deep, but on the most thorough and scholarly search for truth of which all of us are capable to discover. (I'll provide just a few practical suggestions about how to read the Bible at the end of this article).

I believe what our Presbyterian Constitution, The Book of Order and The Book of Confessions, guide us in believing is that isolating certain statements of Scripture and using them to prove a particular viewpoint is not when we are at our best. In other words, if I am really to hear what the Word of God has to say to me today, I cannot be individualistic in my reading of Scripture. I need to remain in conversation with other Christians and with the whole church.

We Presbyterians do believe in the importance of listening to each other when it comes to interpreting the Bible. No matter how alien a viewpoint may be to us on first exposure to it, we have a responsibility to hear it fully and not reject it out-of-hand.

What this means is that we are called to adopt the role of a student toward our sisters and brothers in the church. As a minister I am often asked what I believe. The fact is what I believe over the years has changed as I continue to grow in faith and understanding as a life-long student of the Bible. More appropriate, it seems to me, is the question of in WHOM

We Presbyterians welcome what archaeologists, historians and linguists have to tell us about the Bible. But be careful about believing everything you hear on television, as so very often it is NOT the result of scholarly effort, but viewer rat-


Finally, I like being a Presbyterian because it is a great relief not to have to always be "right!" A reading of our confessions these past 2,000 years shows that even the greatest minds had only limited understanding, even got it wrong at times, and had to be updated. That means I can entertain the possibility that, as obvious as something appears to me, I might be wrong. In fact, if growing in grace and truth means anything, then perhaps I ought to delight in finding out that some concepts I have held to be true may require modification.

I close with some practical suggestions about reading the Bible:

- Read the Bible for the most natural meaning. That was John Calvin's rule. Don't stretch the text you read into something more obscure or something that is self-serving.
- Read the Bible in context. Jesus' statement that "you will always have the poor with you," is not an invitation to ignore the disadvantaged but is rather a sad commentary on the world.
- Read the Bible with Christ in the center. All ethics and all attitudes need to be judged by their closeness to Jesus Christ. He is the ultimate revelation of God. He is the true Word.
- Just read it. You don't have to have a minister to read it. But use the help of a commentary and other friends to
- For those of you who are young, let the Bible be for you a star by which you may learn and be guided. To you who are middle aged, let it be a steady beat by which you march. And to those of you in your older years, let the Bible be a fountain of unfailing hope and strength!
